Scotch eggs: a Rudy family holiday tradition

Christmas was always one of the best times of the year for our family. Growing up on an Army base in Germany, the odds of having at least a few inches of snow in December were pretty good. School would be on hiatus for a few weeks, so my brother and I and our friends would make the most of the shortened days on the sledding hill behind our apartment block, a doubly sloping expanse with an enormous pear tree sticking out of it. The lot of us would trudge up and propel ourselves down again and again, until the hillsides were stripped bare of snow. As evening fell, my brother and I would head inside cold, wet and exhausted, but would always be met by a hot mug of cocoa or egg nog.

As Christmas Eve approached, the family would head off base – or "on the economy," it was called – to nearby Trier or Idar-Oberstein to see the outdoor *Weihnachtsmarkt*. Kiosks and stalls would fill the city square, selling candles, blown glass decorations, Polish pottery, handmade toys and all sorts of sweets and baked goods. Cups of mulled Glühwein or a cone of roasted chestnuts held in mittened hands, we'd browse around and soak in the sounds and smells that were unique to this season.

In the German fashion, we'd open gifts on Christmas Eve after evening service at the base chapel. When we awoke early Christmas morning, my brother and I would have stockings filled with treats and a few small straggling gifts to surprise us. And while we tried not to break our teeth on a wedge of chocolate orange, our mum would fix herself some coffee before making our family her Scotch eggs.

More than any other part of the holiday season, that plate with a Scotch egg on it felt the most like Christmas in our household. The tree might be up for a few weeks and the reduced fat nog could be bought by the gallon well into February, but only one morning a year were we able to enjoy the egg – soft-boiled, wrapped in sausage and fried – while playing with some special new things and hanging around together, just the four of us.

It's a tradition I still continue, and a one I don't mind sharing. To make your own, you will need...

- two pounds of pork sausage
- one cup of bread crumbs
- two eggs, whisked
- six eggs, soft-boiled for 3 or 4 minutes
- enough flour to dredge with
- seasonings

Preheat your oven to 350 degrees and have a baking sheet ready, but out of the way. To fry the eggs, have either a deep pan with oil or a deep fryer hot and ready, at around 300 degrees or so

Season your sausage as you prefer; I like a tablespoon of mustard powder, some garlic and a dash of cloves. Divide the sausage into six parts and flatten into rounds. Lightly flour a peeled, boiled egg and pop one into the center of each sausage patty. Roll the sausage up over the egg, then dredge this with flour. Set up a couple of bowls with the whisked eggs and bread-crumbs in each. Coat each floury meatball in the egg before rolling it in breadcrumbs.

You now have half a dozen Scotch eggs, ready to fry. Once the oil is ready, fry your eggs one or two at a time – whichever seems safest according to the method you're using – making sure to turn them as they brown. Once the sausage is a golden color, you may want to dry the excess oil from your eggs with a paper towel before transferring them to your baking sheet. Once all are done pop the lot of them into the oven for five or ten minutes.

Let them cool then serve with your favorite sauce or syrup.

Directions:

Insert a bamboo skewer or a similar facsimile in the bottom of the date until the pointy tip rests on the bottom of the pit. Push the pit out of the stem side. Reserve dates.

Using your sharpest knife, cut Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese into 1/4-inch slices. Cut those slices into 1/4-x-1-inch pieces (the resulting 1-inch pieces should be approximately the same diameter as a pencil). Cut the tip of each piece at a 45-degree angle.

Leading with the pointy end, stuff a stick of Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese into the pit hole of each date.

Wrap each date with a slice of bacon. Set dates on a baking sheet, seam-sides down, and skewer each with a toothpick to hold bacon in place.

Bake for approximately 20 minutes, or until bacon is crispy. Caution: These cocktail dates are like molten lava when they come out of the oven. Let cool for a few minutes before serving.

KING CRAB APPETIZERS

Ingredients

2 (12 ounce) packages refrigerated biscuit dough

- 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1 (6 ounce) can crab meat, drained
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 2 tablespoons thinly sliced green onion
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce 1 pinch paprika

Directions

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C). Lightly grease 12 tartlet pans.

Divide rolls in half and press into the prepared tartlet pans. Set aside.

In a large bowl, combine cream cheese, crab, mayonnaise, Parmesan cheese, Cheddar cheese, green onions and Worcestershire sauce. Spoon 1 teaspoon of mixture into tarts and garnish with paprika.

Bake at 375 degrees F (190 degrees C) for 15 to 20 minutes, or until light brown. These freeze wonderfully. Just reheat before serving.

SHRIMP SCAMPI CHEESECAKE APPETIZER

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 onion

6 teaspoons minced garlic

1 pound fresh shrimp, peeled and deveined

12 shells puff pastry, baked

4 tablespoons butter or margarine

3 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese, softened

4 eggs

1/2 cup heavy cream

16 ounces smoked Gouda, grated

2 teaspoons salt

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). In a large skillet over medium-low heat, warm oil and saute onions and garlic until onions are translucent; set aside to cool. When cool, pour off liquid reserving garlic.

Cut shrimp into 1/2 inch pieces, reserving 12 uncut for garnish. In a large skillet over mediumlow heat, melt butter and add reserved garlic and all shrimp; cook shrimp for 2 to 4 minutes or until



done

Remove center circle and a small portion of inside of cooled puff pastry shells.

In a medium bowl, beat cream cheese until creamy; add one egg at a time and beat until well mixed. Add cream, Gouda, onions, shrimp and salt.

Spoon filling into puff pastry shells.

Bake in preheated oven for 20 to 25 minutes or until filling is browned on top. Garnish with whole shrimp and chopped chives; serve.

CHOCOLATE BUTTERMILK PIE

Ingredients

2 unbaked pie shells (9 in. or larger)

2 sticks unsalted butter, room temp

3 3/4 c sugar

1/2 c all-purpose flour

1/3 c cocoa powder

6 eggs

1/4 tsp salt (optional)1 1/2 tsp vanilla extract

1 c plus 2 oz. buttermilk

Directions

Combine sugar, butter and mix until well blended. Beat in the eggs and mix well. In a separate bowl, combine flour, cocoa and salt. Whisk until mixed. Add to the butter mixture. Add buttermilk, vanilla and stir until well mixed. Pour into pie shells and bake at 350 for 45 minutes. Since oven temperatures vary, bake as long as it takes for the pie to be firm and not jiggle in the middle. Cool completely before cutting. Store leftover pie in refrigerator.

Using a large pot, saute chopped onions in butter until soft but not browned. In a small bowl, combine flour, salt and pepper. Stir flour mixture into onion mixture. Add milk and half and half. Stir and cook over medium heat until mixture begins to thicken (about 3 minutes). Turn off heat. Add 1 1/2 cups cheese to the sauce and stir until melted and smooth. Add sliced potatoes, bacon and stir well to combine. Pour mixture into a casserole dish sprayed with non-stick spray. Cover with foil and bake at 350 for 35 minutes.Remove foil, sprinkle reserved cheese over top and return to oven. Bake another 30 minutes or until potatoes are soft, cheese is melted and edges begin to brown. Let stand a few minutes before serving to allow the sauce to thicken.

And they came in haste, and found Mary, Joseph, and the babe lying in the manger.


And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child.

tions at my fingertips with the click of my bluetooth computer mouse), the meaning of the newborn child "Immanuel", has remained the same, "God with us."



How to clean-up Christmas tree sap

Wrestling with a Christmas tree can mean getting covered with sap.

Decorating is one of the many traditions associated with the holiday season. The family Christmas tree is arguably the most prominent decoration. Having a live tree inside the home can be awe-inspiring, but it can also be quite messy.

The idea of bringing a formerly live tree inside a home as a decoration may seem odd, especially when individuals are faced with the aftermath,

which is often a trail of pine needles and very sticky sap. A freshly cut pine tree will ooze sap, which tends to be quite sticky and messy and notoriously difficult to remove. Even a Christmas tree that is average in stature can generate a fair amount of sap, and it takes just a few drops of sap to make a mess.

If sap has you stuck for cleanup ideas, consider these home remedies.

On clothing: Use rubbing alcohol on the sap stain. Allow the alcohol to sit on the stain for 30


minutes and then wash as usual. Make a paste of laundry detergent and water and apply it to the stain. Ammonia also may remove a sap stain. Just test an inconspicuous part of the clothing to determine if applying ammonia changes its color.

On carpeting: Freeze the sap with ice cubes and then carefully pick out the hardened pieces. Try vodka as an adhesive remover on the sap stain. Rubbing alcohol also may be able to break up sap in carpet fibers.

On hands: Any greasy, oil-based product can work, such as olive oil or even vegetable short-ening. Rub on the skin, and the sap should come right off. A lubricant like WD-40 has also been known to remove sap.

Hand sanitizer, which is comprised mainly of alcohol, can help dissolve sap so it can be rinsed off. Make a paste of mineral oil (baby oil) and baking soda. This should help dissolve the sap and make your hands soft in the process.

In hair: Sap can be notoriously difficult to get out of human hair or animal fur. Try coating the sap in natural peanut butter or mayonnaise, both of which have a high oil content. Allow to sit for a while and then comb out the sap with a fine-toothed comb. If tree sap cannot be removed, cutting it out may be the only option.


Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree Lighting


The first Christmas tree at Rockefeller Center was erected in 1931, two years before the opening of Rockefeller Plaza, where the tree now draws thousands of tourists each year. The tradition began when construction workers hard at work on building Rockefeller Center decorated a roughly 20-foot tall balsam fir tree on Christmas Eve in 1931. Strings of cranberries and tin cans were among the items used to decorate the tree.

While there was no tree in 1932, the first official tree was unveiled in 1933 in Rockefeller Plaza, and the lighting ceremony was broadcast over NBC Radio. The 1933 tree, at 50 feet tall,

dwarfed the 1931 tree. However, the 1933 tree paled in comparison to the 10-ton Norway Spruce erected in 1999, which measured 100-feet tall and remains the tallest tree ever erected at Rockefeller Center.

The tradition of the Rockefeller Center tree continues to evolve to this day, but the evergreen it is no longer lit with incandescent light bulbs. LED bulbs that consume a fraction of the energy of traditional bulbs are the bulbs of choice now. In addition, in 2007 Rockefeller Center partnered with Habitat for Humanity, who used the tree after it was taken down to furnish lumber for home construction.

Christmas Traditions around the word: Mexico

When you think about Christmas, you assume snow and cold, but not in Mexico. When it comes to Christmas down south the weather is warm and mild during the holiday season. Families decorate their homes with colorful flowers, moss, lanterns and evergreens.

From December 16 until Christmas Eve families participate in "Las Pasadas" for nine nights. The children are given candles and figures of Mary and Joseph. Many Mexican children receive gifts from Santa Claus on Christmas Eve.

The children sing about Joseph and Mary asking for a room in the house, and when they are told that there is no room in the house, they have to go away. However, they are eventually told there is a room and are welcomed in. Each night a different house holds the Pasada party with food, games like piñata and fireworks. A piñata is a clay or box filled with sweets and hung from the ceiling, often decorated like a ball with seven peaks around it. The peaks or spikes represent the "seven deadly sins." The blindfolded children are spun around and given a big stick, and they take turns trying to break open the piñata while the piñata is raised and low-

The ninth evening of Las Pasadas is Christmas Eve known as "Buena Noche," and it is considered the most important day of the year to spend time with loved ones. A

manger and the figures are put on display. When the Pasada house has been found, a baby Jesus is put into the manger called "Nacimiento" and everyone attends Midnight Mass. After the church service, the church bells ring out and fireworks light up the sky.


Christmas Day is a time for church and family. After church services, Christmas dinner traditionally consists of oxtail soup with beans and hot chili, roasted turkey and a salad of fresh fruits and vegetables.

On Epiphany, or Twelfth Night which is January 5 some children get presents from the "Los Reyes Magos," or the Three Kings who pass through on their way to Bethlehem. Children leave their

shoes on the windowsill and find them filled with a little gift the next morning. Christmas Trees are becoming more popular in Mexico, but the most important decoration is still the "Nacimiento."

It's also traditional to eat a special cake called "Rosca de Reyes" or Three Kings Cake on Epiphany. A figure of baby Jesus is hidden inside the cake and whoever has the baby Jesus in their piece of cake is the "Godparent" of Jesus for that year and has to give a tamale party on February 2, "Candlemas." The whole family helps prepare the tamales, which are a meat or chicken wrapped in corn dough. A religious service held on "Candlemas" marks the end of the Christmas season in Mexico.


